### Scott Jones

His most recent publications include *Market, State, and Just Growth* (2003), with Atul Kohli and *Korea in Transition* (2002, co-edited with David Steinberg).

**Lim Sung-hack** is research Professor at Yonsei Leadership Center, Yonsei University. His Ph.D. in Political Science from the Pennsylvania State University. His teaching and research interests fall in the areas of political economy, democratization, NGOs, governance, and campaign finance with an area emphasis on East Asia. ### Song Jong-hwan

Visiting Professor of Myongji University, Dr. Song received an MALD from Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University, and a Ph. D. in Political Science from Hanyang University. He participated in South-North Korean dialogues in the early 1970s as assistant to the South Korean chief delegate, and served as secretary to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Board of Unification Affairs, Office of the President. He was also a diplomat for the UN and the U.S. Specializing in Communist negotiation behavior, he authored *North Korean Negotiating Behavior* (2002) among others.
