Lee Sang-Hyun

Director of the Security Studies Program, the Sejong Institute, formally a research fellow at the Korean Institute for International Studies and the Korea Institute for Defense Analysis. He graduated from Seoul National University (B.A. and M.A.), and earned a Ph.D. in political science at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. He recently authored *A New World Order and Northeast Asian Security* (2004, in Korean); and wrote "A New U.S. Global Defense Posture and the Future of Korea-U.S. Alliance" (2004); and "U.S. East Asian Strategy and the Future of U.S.-Japan Security Cooperation."

Jhe Seong-Ho

Professor at Chung-Ang University. He has an SJD in legal science from the Seoul National University. Formerly, a senior research fellow at the Korea Institute for National Unification, specializing in international law and laws on inter-Korean relations, he authored *How to Build a Peace Structure on the Korean Peninsula* (2000, in Korean). Educated at Yonsei University (B.A.) and Tokyo University (M.A. and Ph.D. in economics), he authored *Can North Korea Escape from the Economic Crisis?* (2004, in Japanese); *Korea-China Exchanges: Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow* (2004, in Korean); and *China's Special Economic Zones, and their Impact on the Economic Development of Modern China* (Praeger, 1997).

Kwak Jae-Sung

Professor of Latin American Studies at the Graduate School of Pan-Pacific International Studies, Kyung Hee University, he earned his Ph.D. in international politics from University of Liverpool, UK. He is the Secretary General of the Latin American Studies Association of Korea (LASAK) and has worked extensively on Latin American and global affairs. His recent works includes "Cuban Transition to Open Economy: 1990 Onwards" (2002); "War on Terrorism and US policy towards Latin America" (2003); and "Spanish Foreign Direct Investment in Latin America in the 1990s" (2003).

Dr. Kwon is a research fellow at the Korea Institute for International Economic Policy (KIEP) in Seoul, Korea.
